**Executive Office Report Executive Officer: Rick Hibbs,D/C** 



It's been a tough summer. We've lost two very good friends in the span of a month. After a lengthy bout with cancer, we lost **P/Lt/C Kevin Parks, AP** on June 29<sup>th</sup>. A month later, we lost **P/C Steve Heffron, SN** to a surprise heart attack on July 28th, the Sunday morning of the Rendezvous weekend. First, I'll tell you about Kevin.

I've known Kevin Parks, who joined the squadron in December of 1984, for as long as I've been in the Rochester Squadron. We started out, as many of us have, chatting over a beer after a meeting. It's been so long past, I don't remember if it was at GYC or RYC. As for anyone who knows Kevin, we were friends from our first conversation, which was lengthy. Again, as anyone who knows Kevin, most conversations could get lengthy. But they were never boring!

Many squadron members remember Kevin as the friendly bar tender at a conference hospitality room. He was also a long time Editor of the Chart. When he turned the editor job over to his lovely wife Rita, he continued getting advertisers for the Chart, when we were printing and mailing hard copy editions. His long running (and entertaining!) column *"Ramblin' on the River"* was not only a discourse of local water activities but was a subtle and effective way for Kevin to advertise the local businesses and restaurants that supported us with their advertising!

When we taught every course at least once a year, with class sizes usually in double digits, we needed to teach Seamanship and Piloting twice a year. Can you believe that? Well, I caught Kevin in a moment of weakness, and he agreed to teach Seamanship once a year! We taught together for several years, with me doing the Fall class, and Kevin doing the Spring class. We both felt strongly that the Rules of the Road and boat handling topics were some of the most important topics that every boater needed. Kevin knew the Rules better than anyone I knew, and he could (and usually DID) quote chapter and verse in detail! If you owned a wooden craft, you would eventually be talking to Kevin for advice on its care and maintenance! His *Riverboat Gambler* was a source of pride and joy for him and Rita. His skills, honed to a high level through years of having wooden craft, were often sub-contracted by Al Gilbert and Voyager Marine to service customer vessels. Kevin was also a long-time member of the Irondequoit Bay Fish and Game Club on Irondequoit Bay. Not surprising, but Kevin ran raffles at the IBF&GC, as he often did for our squadron. Between his dock mates on the river, the Fish & Game Club friends, and squadron members, Kevin had his finger on the local boating scene, and eventually began amassing over a hundred Vessel Safety Checks each year! His knowledge of river history made for an entertaining commentary on river rides aboard the Harbor Town Belle. The entire Rochester area boating community will miss Kevin in many ways, but especially as I will, as a long-time good friend. And as he often ended "Ramblin' on the River", I say "Let's raise a glass to Kevin!" Stf/C Rick Hibbs, SN-IN

Five and a half years after Kevin joined, we were lucky enough to have Steve Heffron join our squadron, with his wife Debbie and their two young kids, David and Abbie in May of 1990. Steve and Debbie wasted no time getting involved with our squadron, and Steve took on the Asst Squadron Education Officer post in 1993. Steve was always very involved with the Education Department with stints as SEO from 1995-97, and again from 2009 to 2018. He has also provided vital contributions as an instructor in Electronics courses, JN and N, and any other courses needed.

He was not slacking off between SEO stints, but rather held other offices in between, including Administrative Officer, Executive Officer, and serving as our Commander in 2008. Debbie and Steve added their talents to our Squadron Rendezvous events, with some memorable ones at Pultneyville Yacht Club when they were members. Steve had been teaching marine captain training courses with P/D/C Chris Tertinek, SN for the past 21 years. The last three were through their own business, "North Coast Marine Training, LLC". He was a member of the Sodus Bay Maritime Captains Assoc. for the last 13 years. Steve enjoyed the cruising grounds of the "1000 Islands" and vacationed there often on his boat "GranD.A.D.S." In case you didn't know, the DADS name (also used on previous boats) is an acronym for "David, Abbie, Debbie, Steve"! One of the most interesting cruising incidents I've heard about involved Steve in the islands when his engine quit. He and Debbie made day signals of two black circles, one above the other, using paper plates colored black and hoisted up for all to see. This indicates a "vessel not under command", which I pointed out to Steve that only a few of us boaters would recognize. Steve replied "Yeah but all the commercial traffic and ferries will know what it means. Those are the ones I'm worried about!" Fantastic thinking! (By the way, he was able to get the boat back under command!)

I have benefited from Steve's knowledge, experience and friendship over the years. Rare was the month that we didn't meet for lunch to discuss squadron activities, district activities, teaching strategies, and many other subjects, including, of course, season prospects for the Buffalo Bills! Many a time that I mentioned a problem or difficulty I was dealing with, Steve would volunteer "I can help with that!" As an example, we had been discussing for some months the reintroduction of on the water contesting at district events. After some positive reaction at the D6 Spring Conference to my proposals to put contesting back into the rendezvous schedule, I asked Steve if he could do a contest for this year's rendezvous.

One of the last things he did for District 6 was to design and write a contest for the 2024 D6 Rendezvous at Sylvan Beach. It made for a fun event, with a 6-person crew attempting to do the contest Steve wrote. It was well received as a fun activity though with no other team competing. All involved agreed we should make contesting part of future rendezvous events. A trophy dedicated to the memory of **P/C Steve Heffron, SN** will be proposed at the District 6 Fall Conference to be awarded annually to the best contest team.

We will surely miss Steve's contributions to the Rochester Squadron's education program, to District 6, and to training future maritime captains. And I will surely miss monthly luncheons with my long-time lunch and drinking buddy. A rum and coke to you Steve!

## Treasurer's Report Lt/C Bridgett Arieno



In 2022, the Coast Guard amended portable fire extinguisher rules for recreational vessels. The rules do not change the number or types of fire extinguishers required on board but do simplify the inspection and record-keeping requirements.

America's Boating Channel video <u>"Fire Extinguisher</u> <u>Regulations"</u> offers an overview of the rules that separate commercial and recreational vessel fire protection requirements. It also features tips for preventing onboard fires in the first place. A second video titled <u>"Fire Extinguisher Standards"</u> offers tips for placing and servicing fire extinguishers. Above all, ensure the proper number of functional fire extinguishers are on board, readily accessible and that everyone knows to pull, aim, squeeze, and sweep.

Invite your friends and neighbors to watch, like and subscribe to America's Boating Channel on YouTube as a fun and educational introduction to what our organization has to offer. These videos and more also are available via the America's Boating Channel free on-demand app on Apple TV, Roku or FireTV.
